As we have the active LAN connection and all the departments are connected with each other and they can share the required data, we can also receive the data of
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various Stakeholders through the web based management system. The stakeholders are interconnected with the college ERP. 1. Student admission is made online 2. In our ERP system separate users are created with their respective role and privilege. 3. We process and retrieve the student data through Student Information System(SIS) module in ERP. 4. Through the HRMS system employee salary, promotion, sanction etc are done by West Bengal Government IFMS. 5. All the activities of Financial Accountant System (FAS) are continuing with the ERP. 6. Through the communication module in our ERP college communicates with the stakeholders and vice versa. 7. West Bengal Health Scheme of our employees is done in online mode. 8. Data is being collected on several parameters such as teachers, students, enrolment, programmes, results, finance information, infrastructure etc. through the computer based information system. 9. Through MIS administrative notifications and feedbacks are communicated. 10. Budget allocation information is usually sent to each department in electronic mode. 11. Department can access the data from the college ERP. 12. Student data is imported in Library management software through the MIS system.

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

At the beginning of the academic session IQAC conducted a workshop on implementation of CBCS curriculum prescribed by university. Every department follows the syllabus and allocates assignments to the teaching members of the department. Every teacher makes a teaching plan to complete his/her assignments. Number of classes for each topic is assigned according to the syllabus and credits (Semester-I & III) for each topic /Group / Paper etc. The Time Table Committee prepares a time table for each year / semester under the supervision of the Vice- Principal. For PG departments the respective departmental coordinators prepare time table and assign number of classes for each topic as per the given credit. We have an enriched library with open access system and each department has a seminar library for the use of the students. Various teaching methods based on the specific needs of the different subjects are used to inculcate academic interest such as - i) Chalk and talk methods ii) ICT enabled teaching learning method iii) Seminars presentations by the students iv) Field works, educational excursions are carried by some

departments v) Class tests, viva-voce are also conducted by some departments to improve the quality of the students. vi) Seminars, special lectures also arranged regularly for students.

Feedback Obtained

The college collects the feedback from the students, Alumni and parents. IQAC analyzed the feedback through MS Excel and the information was forwarded to competent authority for necessary action and recommendations. The college authority acts according to the data in the light of feedback received. As per the feedback from students obtained through SSS in the academic session 2018-19, the following measures were taken. 1. As per the SSS, 29 of students said that ICT usage in classroom teaching is low. Therefore the college authority has encouraged teachers to use power-point presentation more thoroughly and regularly as part of the teaching-learning program. 2. Few students complained about the poor preparations of individual teachers for the classes. The administration has sensitized the teachers so that such problems are solved. 3. Better communication skills in teachers are prioritized on the basis of feedback received from few students who found communication skills of teachers poor. 4. While mentors are allotted to all honours students few mentioned that they don't know the respective individual mentor. Thus greater focus is given to mentor-mentee relationship development. 5. Teachers are advised to focus more in identifying the weaknesses of each student and mentor them sufficiently.

All departments have been conducting class tests after each unit (or a section of the syllabus) is taught. There are also provisions for surprise class tests. There are mid-term examinations for each subject and stream. Similarly, before each University examination, a selection test is held for all years so that their progress and readiness with regard to university examination can be judged. After class tests and selection tests examiner/ examinee meetings are held to help students understand what they have to do to perform better in the future. Moreover, there are remedial classes for students who underperform in class tests as well as selection tests. In this academic year, along with Commerce, Arts and Science subjects were also brought within CBCS. And thus, all necessary reforms related to the time-table and class test related issues involving tutorial projects and internal evaluation as well as attendance calculation were taken care of.
